In the meantime, congratulations on a job well done. Keep in touch and help build the network.

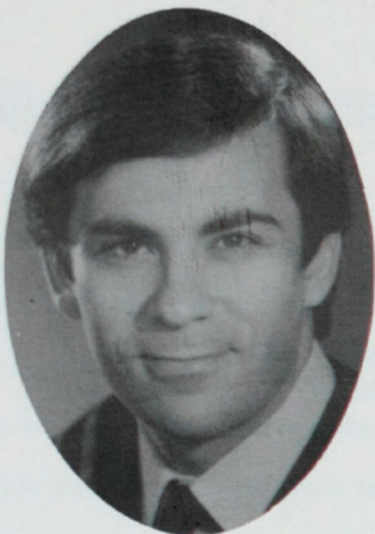

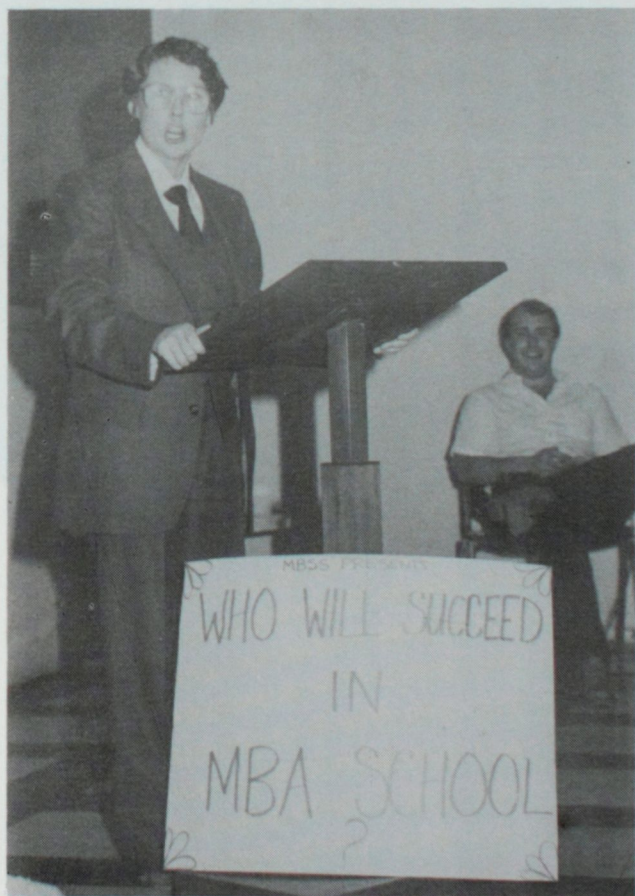
Beer & Skit Night

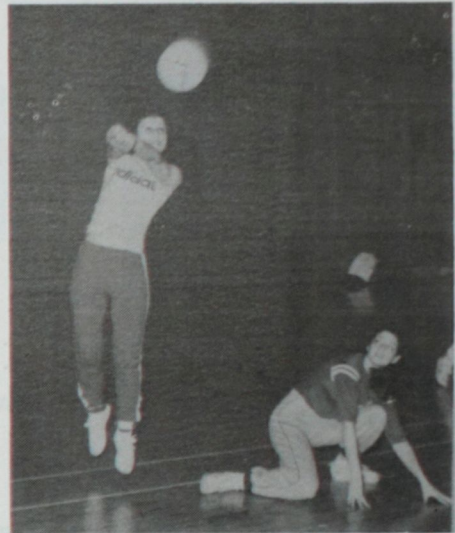
MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

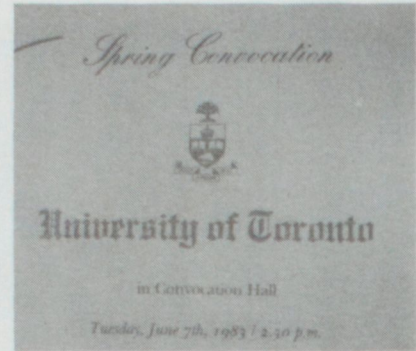

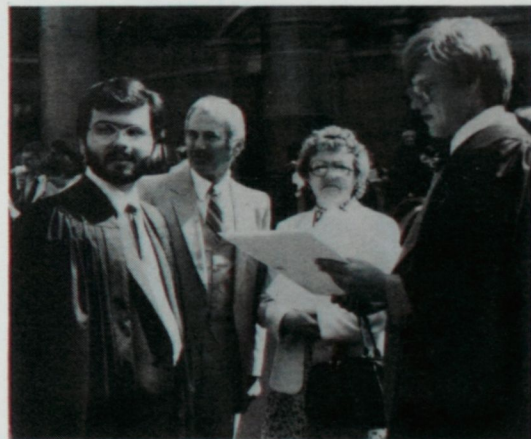
