The Business and Technology Group (BTG) was formed in February 1994 and consists of Dave Castell, Jeffrey Feldberg, Steven Ottaway, and Michael Shiner. Our mandate is simple: "To improve your MBA experience through technology"

We first started with a Bulletin Board System called e-biz in February 1994. By allowing students, faculty, and administration to log on to e-biz the communications in the Toronto MBA was greatly enhanced. At the same time, people who used e-biz increased their computer communication skills which makes them extremely competitive in the work place. The results of e-biz have been fantastic. The different streams of the Toronto MBA program are now interacting with one another, professors provide feedback to students' questions at all hours of the day, including weekends. In addition, the quality of our program continually increases as students, faculty and administrative staff all work together, on-line in e-biz, to find solutions to 'opportunities'. e-biz has led the way in making the Toronto MBA a world class program and has set the standard for MBA programs both in Canada and the United States.

The newest project for the BTG is with the Internet. The BTG is producing a World Wide Web (WWW) site for all the world to visit. The WWW site will provide information on the Toronto MBA program through text, pictures, sounds, and video. Anyone with access to the Internet will be able to get information on our highly qualified professors, outstanding courses, as well as business related information. As a result, the Toronto MBA will be promoted world wide. Stu-

dents will have an excellent opportunities to expand their business network on a global level. The WWW ebiz will also enhance students' skill on the information highway. The BTG looks forward in continuing to bring new and exciting innovations to the Toronto MBA, and at the same time, increase the competitiveness of our program on a global basis.





Remember this year as the year that the bond market was massacred. It was also the year that derivatives died (well, almost). And it was a very, very tough year to find a full-time position in finance with thousands laid off in New York, and hundreds in Toronto (due to the slow market and the merger of Nesbitt Thomson and Burns Fry). There is no doubt, however, that once my fellow UofT finance students get into the industry, they will be very successful.

The Finance Association had the mandate for the year to help students learn more about finance and to help them prepare for their job search. The greatest success for the year was our Jobs Resource Book, which has been used hundreds of times in the library. The compilation of job descriptions, articles of interest, and most importantly, addresses, was helpful to many students deciding on their future. The Spring '95 edition added more addresses and a very interesting section on interview experiences.

The Speaker Series took a while to get going, but included some excellent talks. The derivatives talk of Isaac Muskat, managing director of TMG Financial Products, was a little complicated but very interesting. Helen Sinclair, president of the Canadian Bankers Association, gave an excellent talk about the future of Canadian banking and financing the new economy. Steve Isenberg of CIBC/ Wood Gundy was casual and informative, giving the "Everything you wanted to know about real-world finance, but didn't have anyone to ask" talk. Paul Johnson, manager of investor services at Altimira, along with Lucy Lukic described the approach to

building a balanced portfolio. Paul Starita, the former president of Royal Trust, spoke in joint session with the Unilever Series about empowering front-line individuals as the key to success in the financial services sector.

About 15 students had the opportunity to attend the Treasury Management Association of Canada conference held in Toronto. In exchange for a little work as a volunteer, the students were given the opportunity to attend talks, visit exhibitors and meet industry contacts. This outstanding contact with UofT and the executive of the Finance Association led the TMAC to begin a student membership, of which UofT currently has the most members. Hopefully, this will continue into the future.


conference at the Design Exchange in






IBA

Facing challenges with confidence is one of the good things in life. From Hans, Michelle and myself . . . best wishes for continued confidence and success in the future.


