The 1995/6 academic year at the University of Toronto Faculty of Management was a great and pivotal time in the history of the school. We were all fortunate to be witnesses to and participants in this successful period as the Faculty continues its progress toward achieving world-class distinction in management education.

One of the most important events of the past year was, of course, the opening of the new Joseph L. Rotman Centre for Management, the striking new custom-designed, permanent home of the Faculty. Described as a "gem" by a Toronto newspaper, the Rotman Centre has brought everyone in the Faculty together for the first time ever — undergraduates, graduate students, executives, faculty, and staff. Our previous five separate locations were condensed into one functioning, user-friendly space.

The excitement and optimism engendered by the move to our new home is emblematic of the great changes, growth and improvement that still lie ahead for the Faculty. The goal is to be the preeminent business school in Canada and to be one of the leading business schools of North America and the world. We have chosen to do this by focusing our resources and attention on the MBA program, the executive program, including both the Executive MBA Program and our partnership with businesses, and the Doctoral Program. These are three fundamental core areas in which we want to excel. While we have much work yet to do, we are confident that a strategy of insisting upon excellence will rapidly move us toward our goal. As necessary and important as our new home is to the prospects of this school, it is ultimately the people — students, faculty, staff, alumni, friends — who will make this one of the world's best business schools. In this regard, we have every reason to be optimistic about our future: the quality of the current student has never been higher, nor entry in the various programs more competitive. This is a business school that is going places!

This was indeed a banner year for the school, and I am happy you were along for the journey. For those of you who are entering the ranks of Faculty alumni this year, I hope that the Faculty will continue to be a positive influence in your lives. 

An entertaining debate between Bob Rae, former Premier of Ontario, and our own John Crispo, was a highlight. As moderator, John Fraser, Master of Massey College, kept Bob and John under control with amusing interjections. CPAC and City-TV televised Rae's first public presentation since retirement.
