In fact, many of us left a secure job seeking career advancement or, in several cases, an entire career switch. Others used the MBA to supplement their law or engineering programs and faced the unique challenge of balancing several academic commitments and explaining to loved ones why one or two extra year school were better than the income from one or two extra years of work. Many of you traveled 100s and 1000s of miles, leaving friends and family behind, make Toronto your home. You faced the additional uncertainty of a new culture, a new people, and a never-ending winter.

And then came Orientation Camp... what an incredible 72 hours! The difference between expectation and outcome was staggering! Initially, I inferred that orientation would be sterile with present tions, suits, MBA lingo, and laptops - that could not have been further from reality. Rather, camp was raw, real, and rugged... it was an unparalleled opportunity to get to know people. Moreover, it was the first time that I realized that the next two years could really work out.

Amidst orientation activities, I also realized that MBA students are inherently competitive – whether it is at a three-legged race, dodge-ball, or casino night, we all play to win. However, I also learn that we share an unspoken bond, which would ultimately evolve into enduring friendships necessary for survival and sanity.

As well, Camp was an opportunity to get a quick glimpse of some of our colleagues' hidden talents: like David Rozin's radio broadcaster voice on the bus ride up; Sid Malkani's fascination with mon at Casino night; Henri Guay's theatrical skills playing an exercising baby in a diaper; and Steve Kurash's way with the ladies as the Blue Falcon. Was that for real? Well, what happened at camp stays camp.

On the ride home, I realized that although we all come from unique circumstances and individual backgrounds, we are all in this together. While the MBA program is rigorous and tiring, knowing that you are sharing the same ups and downs with 270 others makes the experience a lot more palatable. As such, Camp taught me that an MBA is not about the three letters; rather, it is about the people, the friendships, and the memories.

First day of class... talk about another expectation-outcome mismatch. We all filed into our classrooms and lay claim on our seats for the next four months. As an aside, I am not entirely sure how this happens, but somehow we get extremely attached to our location within the class. So much so that sitting in another spot is considered an egregious sin. We have all experienced this at some point: a naive guest or an absent minded colleague is sitting in your seat when you walk in a few minutes late. The first thing you do is rub your eyes to make sure that what you are seeing is actual happening. Then, almost defeated, you scrounge for another available seat. However, now you have committed the same crime the first person did and all of this has resulted in a vicious cycle. You are so consumed with the unexpected series of events that the first half of class passes by before you are able to catch your bearings. My humble advice to the first years: stick to your seats I ann as little attention as possible. The worst is when Professors such as Ramy Elitzur, Tim Rowley, or Jia Lin Xie remark: "You don't usually sit there!" Be prepared to be the class target.

Anyways, I digress... The first day of school - I recall thinking that the first few days (probably first week) will be relatively slow as the professors ease us into the Rotman curriculum. For so many of a the transition to school, sitting in a classroom, taking notes, writing exams, and stressing about our GPA were years removed. Boy was I wrong. Things were busy from the get go.

To make things worse, each person seemed successively more impressive than the last - from owning their own businesses to speaking five languages to managing with four kids. I remember asking myself: do I really belong? I would be lying if I said that the first few weeks were not filled with uncertainty and confusion. Specifically, graphs left and right in managerial economics, cookie jars in financial accounting, and the T A O model in FIT - what were they all talking about? On reflection, while Q1 was only six weeks long. MPO seemed to go on forever. However, to its defense, MPO represented the one course that, regardless of your background, you could relate to. As such, my second realization at the MBA program is that business is not about strategy or finance; rather, its about the people. Outside of the classroom, Q1 was the birth of Thirsty Thursdays, Tipsy Tuesdays, and for many others... Wicked Wednesdays, Freaky Fridays, Wild Weekends or any other excuse to get together will fee friends over a drink or two. As well, it represented our first opportunity to get immersed in extracurricular life and begin to leave our lasting imprint at Rotman. As a class, we have been incread active: we have successfully competed in case competitions at home and in the United States; we raised unprecedented funds for the United Way; hosted 70 Grade 11 students in She Biz; foundes Rotman's Business Design Club; printed the Inaugural edition of Rotman's newspaper Integrate This!; expanded the study tour program to include South Africa in addition to China and India; and supported a record number of students on international exchange (many of whom cannot be here to celebrate with us tonight but are remembered and missed). While this brief description only tures a fraction of what we have accomplished over the last two years, it demonstrates that we, as future leaders, are committed to social responsibility and promise to strengthen the link between the link betwee business and society.

In reflecting on the last two years, I have spent a great deal of time thinking about some of the notable academic highlights. In addition to surviving Q2/Q3 exams and handing in monster deliver-ables - often with only minutes to spare or after praying that the staple held together after sliding the assignment under the PSO door - we have also experienced several unique Rotman-specific opportunities. The Q2 Strategy Case Competition randomly assigned us to new study groups in order to prepare a presentation within a modest 24 hours. The topic... Ice Fili: a Russian purveyor of ice cream. While it sounds like a challenge straight out of The Apprentice, it represents the expectations that future employers will have when we start our new jobs; that is, to work as effectively a possible with a new group of colleagues with your performance linked to the team's collective output. Similarly, Porter Airlines forced us to deal with the uncomfortable reality of ambiguity. With it direction, we were forced to create a business plan in order to procure private equity funding and present, in real time, to a board of prominent alumni and members of the local business communi While both of these tasks were stressful, time consuming, and exhausting, they have helped me arrive at my third realization: business is not only about theories, facts, or figures; rather, it is about creativity, communication, and lateral thinking... It is about the ideas that surface out of nowhere or as a joke or as a risk! It is about going out on a limb, trying your best, and reaping the rewards of hard work and dedication.

The experiences at Rotman also extend outside of the classroom. Think of our Atrium - perhaps the most versatile space on campus. From corporate leaders to dodge ball to Rendezvous to Ethics to Bollywood movies to a quiet corner to catch up on sleep - the Rotman atrium captures, in one single space, the diversity of our two-year experience. The number of activities, the opportunities, and the unpredictability of school will in deed mirror the real world. Having our friends and colleagues with us is what will ensure survival and long-term success.

While it is tough to believe, life continued outside of Rotman while we were immersed in academic commitments and extracurricular pursuits. Over the last two years, many of us have celebrated incredible life events including getting married, becoming parents, or receiving our Canadian citizenship. However, all of us have come a little closer to understanding who we are, realizing our protian, and dreaming of our future. All of this has been possible largely because of the sacrifices and support of our families, friends, and loved ones. While there were many days that we came home none, two, or even three hours late because of a pressing deliverable; or forgot to call because we had only finance on the mind; or missed dinner to make it to that important info session, they were always there to offer us a smile or pick us up when we were down. From the depths of our hearts... Thank You! We could not have done this without you.

On a personal note... I want to extend my gratitude and appreciation to my wife who has been my pillar and unrelenting support. Over the last two years, she has made several professional and personal sacrifices in order for me to make this MBA a priority. Thank you.

So where are we headed? Who knows? The world is an exciting place! While many of us are certain of our next few steps, none of us know how our individual stories will completely unfold. Regarless, the tools learned at Rotman will prove to be invaluable. One thing is for sure, we won't be able to do it alone - we will continue to rely on our friends to help us sort through some of the most complex challenges as we push the boundaries in business and management. My fourth and final realization is that the true measure of success is not your GPA, or how many job interviews you secured, or how many essays you can pull together in one night; rather, it is how many relationships you take forward.

When we started this program two years ago, all of us took a leap of faith and faced considerable risk: the risk in leaving our jobs, moving to a new country, and facing new academic challenges. Today, as we face the real world, we must continue to challenge ourselves and strive towards excellence.

So if ever asked the question: "Why did you do an MBA?" Feel free to use the following statement containing as many buzz words and acronyms that I could muster: "Well... after deconstructing a macroeconomic environment, conducting a personal SWOT analysis, and completing a Porter's 5-forces on my preferred industry. I realized that I needed something to provide me with a long-terl's sustainable competitive differentiated advantage. However, I also knew that I needed an ROI that could justify this decision. A DCF analysis yielded a positive NPV with an impressive IRR that suggested that Rotman's IT curriculum was for me. Close to the TTC within the heart of the GTA, Rotman would ultimately make me... an MBA.

That being said... Thank you again to all of our friends and family, to the organizing committee, and to the staff and faculty that have made Rotman an unbelievable experience.

▲ IT TAKES A WORLD. UNICEF, the international children's agency, announced that global childhood deaths hit a record low in 2006. Though 9.7 million children died before their fifth birthday, that statistic is down from nearly 13 million in 1990. While the worst rates came from nations plagued by war and violence, some Third World nations have used simple affordable measures to great success. The African country of Mozambique used inexpensive health tips on hydration and nutrition combined with mosquito nets that prevent malaria to drop its child mortality rate by 41 per cent. TURNING A CORNER? After four years of continuous bad news, life in Iraq started to get better last year following the deployment of an additional 30,000 U.S. troops. That effort, combined with deals that turned disaffected former insurgents into paid security forces, resulted in a plunge in the number of bombings and killings. While analysts debate whether Iraqi politicians can maintain the fragile new reality. particularly when the U.S. starts reducing its forces, civilians seized the drop in violence as an opportunity to start rebuilding their shattered country.





▲ BRAVERY IN BURMA. Dressed in vivid orange and red robes, thousands of Buddhist monks marched barefoot through the streets of Rangoon last September. They were joined by thousands of civilians, shouting "Democracy!" Burma has been ruled by a harsh military regime since 1962, which the massive street protests could not defeat. Within days, soldiers and police responded with a brutal crackdown. The government shut off all access to the outside world, including Internet service, and thus the fate of the protestors may never be known. (AP)

THE DYNAMIC DUO. The

passionate crowds of U.S. Democratic party members flocking to presidential candidates' rallies and debates know they are witnessing history in the making. At the party's convention in August, they will nominate either the first black, Barack Obama, or the first woman, Hillary Rodham Clinton to be their presidential hope on the November election ballot.



▲ MUSEUM LOOT. When Italy asked the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City to return a number of objects it claims were illegally lifted from ancient sites, it opened a huge debate in museums around the world: who really owns pieces looted in the past? The debate centred on one object in particular: the Euphronios krater, a Greek vase from the 6th century B.C., that was sold to the Met for \$1 million in 1972. Italy wanted it returned, and after 30 years of wrangling, a deal was reached. In a splashy homecoming celebration, the vase went on display in Rome in January. (Bebeto Matthews/AP)
▲ CAMPUS HERO AMID THE HORROR. On the morning of the Virginia Tech massacre, engineering professor and Holocaust survivor Liviu Librescu, 76, was presenting a slideshow to his class. When shots were heard in the corridor, Librescu pressed himself against the classroom door, blocking the gunman long enough for many of his students to jump to safety through second-floor windows. Librescu was killed that day by Cho Sueng-Hui, who shot 31 other students and professors and then himself in the worst school shooting in U.S. history. Librescu's students remember him as a hero. CHINA SYNDROME. From clothing and electronics to foodstuffs and toys, China is now the world's source for cheap imports. But in recent months, reports of contaminated products point to the downside of our growing dependence on Chinese suppliers. First there was the dog and cat food that killed family pets, next came toothpaste containing

anti-freeze. And then came word that thousands of toys sold across North America were coated in lead-based paint. But China's most dangerous export could be its pollution. Can we tie our desire for cheap goods to demands for environmentally responsible factories? The planet's future may hang in the balance. (Bill Hogan/Chicago Tribune/MCT)

▲ AN OFFICER AND A PRINCE. It was Prince Harry's grandma, Queen Elizabeth II, who told the 23-year-old army officer that he was off for a tour of duty in the dangerous southern Afghanistan. While Harry, his recognizable red hair safely obscured by a helmet, called in air strikes and went on foot patrols, dozens of media outlets kept his location a secret for 10 weeks. This protected the self-described "bullet magnet" and his fellow soldiers from Taliban attacks. But after a U.S. website broke the news, Harry was forced to return home. He was met by his dad, Prince Charles and his elder brother William, who, because he's a future king of England, will never get to see action. (MEXTERING)



▲ HOPING AND PRAYING. Pictures of Madeleine McCann's chubby face, big round eyes and blond hair are plastered throughout Europe. The British toddler went missing from a Portuguese holiday resort just before her fourth birthday last May. When a huge hunt by police and volunteers combined with massive media coverage failed to turn up any clues, her parents launched a website looking for information. Weeks after Madeleine vanished, Quebec was stunned when 10-year-old Cédrika Provencher disappeared in Trois-Rivières while on a bike ride. Missing posters plastered store windows and a massive volunteer effort was organized. Though police continue to investigate, the girls are still missing. (Meeting Genetice)

PAKISTAN UNDER PRESSURE. Reeling from crisis to crisis, Pakistan teetered on the brink of chaos. While al-Qaeda and other terrorists encroached from Afghanistan next door, homegrown militant Islamists at mosques in the capital, Islamabad, fought gun battles with security forces. Meanwhile former political leaders lined up to challenge President Pervez Musharraf, a general who had seized power in a 1999 coup. The main challenger was former prime minister Benazir Bhutto, whose triumphant homecoming after eight years in exile was cut short when she was assassinated in late December during the national election campaign. In February, after voters rejected Musharraf, the big question remained whether anyone could lead Pakistan into calmer waters. **Canada**



▲ ANGEL WISH. When Maddie Babineau, dying of bone cancer, was offered anything she wanted by the Children's Wish Foundation, the 15-year-old Hamilton, Ont., teen passed on a Disney cruise or a shopping spree and instead asked for a new school in the poor Kenyan village of Enelerai. After the foundation granted her request, Babineau started raising the \$10,000 needed to build a well near the school, so kids could attend classes rather than spending hours hauling water for their families. Maddie Babineau died last May, but her mom and brother travelled to Kenya to see the school and the completed well. Her picture hangs in the Grade 7 classroom.

▲ THE DOLLAR PUMPS IRON. On Sept. 20, 2007 the loonie did something no one had seen for 31 years when it became worth more than the U.S. dollar. The loonie briefly soared above US\$1.10 before settling back to the US\$1 range. While northern manufacturers fretted that the high dollar was hurting their exports, delighted Canadian consumers flocked to American malls and Internet shopping sites to take advantage of the exchange rate.



▲ THE HONOUR GUARD. For those concerned that the public, deeply divided over Canada's combat role in Afghanistan, wouldn't support its soldiers, the tributes on a stretch of highway in Ontario proved otherwise. Each time one of our war dead returned to CFB Trenton, thousands of Canadians lined Highway 401 to pay respects to the fallen as the cortiège passed by. The spontaneous nature of the vigils led the province to rename that section of Highway 401 the Highway of Heroes. (Frank Gumr/CP)

▼ TUSSLE FOR THE TUNDRA. As ancient Arctic ice melts faster and faster—the Northwest Passage was fully open last summer—the international fight over who will control the potentially lucrative shipping lanes and natural resources of the Far North is intensifying. As well as bulking up its military forces in the area, Russia planted a flag on the seabed below the North Pole while the United States aggressively pushed its idea that the passage is an international waterway and not, as Canada believes, a domestic route. In response, Ottawa beefed up Canuck claims, announcing plans to build up to eight new icebreakers along with a new Far North military base and a deep-water port on Baffin Island. No word yet on how the true kings of the Arctic, the polar bears, will deal with the newcomers. (Vademic Chatyakov/MP)

▲ RED SERGE TROUBLES. For the RCMP, the last few years have seen a litany of problems. In December 2006 commissioner Giuliano Zaccardelli resigned after giving incorrect testimony to politicians. Then an inquiry, looking into allegations senior officials had covered up problems in RCMP pension and insurance fund, sharply criticized the force's management. Then the focus shifted to policing policies themselves. First to be scrutinized was the habit of solitary policing in isolated settlements after two young officers were killed while responding to calls without back up. Then when a Polish immigrant died after being tasered and held down by RCMP officers at the Vancouver airport, the force faced detailed queries about its use of force. As their woes mount, it's no surprise that the RCMP faces a shortage of new recruits. (Den Denten/UP) RED SERGE TROUBLES. For th



A LOBBYIST AND A PM. As the economy slowed and the debate over the military's role in Afghanistan heated up during the winter, the biggest draw on Parliament Hill wasn't debates in the House of Commons but rather a committee hearing into the relationship between former PM Brian Mulroney and lobbyist Karlheinz Schreiber. The so-called Airbus Affair, which started two decades ago over allegations of kickbacks paid when Air Canada bought new Airbus planes, exploded back to life when PM Stephen Harper announced a public inquiry into the affair, hoping to shed light on the reported \$300,000 paid by Schreiber to Mulroney.
